ENERGY BILL

Thank you for your letter of 7 June 2011. The Bill completed Commons Committee Stage on 21 June 2011 and I am delighted to let you know that the extension of the Renewable Heat Incentive legislation to Northern Ireland has now been incorporated.

I am writing to advise you of a government amendment that we intend to move at the Report Stage in the House of Commons. This is the only government amendment we plan to lay that will apply to Northern Ireland at this stage, and I understand that it is a reserved matter.

Reinstating a modified clause on funded nuclear decommissioning Arrangements

This amendment modifies the original clause 102 to provide that the Secretary of State may not agree to enter into an agreement (setting out when the Secretary of State may, or may not, exercise his power to propose a modification to a Funded Decommissioning Programme) unless satisfied that the agreement includes adequate provision for dealing with modifications of the programme in the event that the programme ceases to be prudent. The amendment will also allow for certain matters to be determined by a third party and the Secretary of State may agree to be bound by such a determination. This amendment is being tabled to address the concerns of committee members, specifically that the clause does not deal with
